## **Sooke Region Food CHI Society**

In the spring of 2007 a group of keen citizens from the region began to meet monthly, sharing a potluck supper of local foods and ideas. The Sooke CHI (Community Health Initiative) group, a collection of social and health associated groups sponsored us. In fact they adopted us. Hence the name CHI continued. These humble gatherings of local farmers with working hands, gardeners with dirty clothes, and interested foodie folk came together to start galvanizing the local food movement in the area.

In 2008 a society was formed and incorporated. Three years later, with a membership of close to 200, Sooke Food CHI, Food CHI for short, has become a household name in our communities. For three years beginning in 2007 and extending to March 2010 we received



seed monies from Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) to contract a part-time coordinator to assist Food CHI in developing and promoting food security strategies and programs. Since April of 2010 we have been without VIHA funding and operate with no paid staff, save for a small contractual fee for service for our Farm Mentorship

Program coordinator. Throughout the year we have special events where our members and volunteers participate to further the purposes of our society. We have an AGM each fall to celebrate our accomplishments.

In keeping with our mission to support local food production and increase numbers of citizens and farmers in growing and distributing food we offer you the following highlights for 2009 and 2010.

#### Farm Mentorship Program

A first for the Sooke Region. Ten protégées mentored with 10 regional farms and farmers to learn the basics of how to set up a farm. Throughout the winter months the protégées spent many weekends at our local farms. Mentoring is a most effective way to learn hands on. #### **SEEDY SATURDAY - February 2010**

Most importantly those who came out attended work shops, purchased and supported local seeds and were encouraged to start their own seed saving this summer. #### DIRT: film night with Awareness Video - March 2010

Well attended film night at EMCS, community theatre, with farm vendors present selling seeds, and Sooke Food CHI promoting its programs and activities. Food CHI's share of the proceeds from the film night went to Sunriver Gardens' development costs.

#### Farm and Food Garden Tour - August 8, 2010

Another first!! Food CHI, with very generous support by the District of Sooke to promote our agriculture, planned and produced this tour to raise funds for our 2nd Farm Mentorship Program 2011 and to raise awareness of our productive farms and gardens in Sooke's west coast climate. This farm and garden tour was offered as the "working garden farm tour" — a tour of 12 unique farm gardens to inspire its visitors and share local knowledge of what grows well in the Sooke area. Close to 300 people took part in this tour on a fine sunny August day. The day was a huge success, and not only was \$2800 raised for the Farm Mentorship program but a number of our farms did well with gate sales and contacts for the Sooke Country Market. The day was successful once again because of our volunteers, our generous farmers and eager-to-learn public.



#### Sunriver Community Allotment Gardens – Phillips Rd

Sooke Food CHI, since its inception in 2007, has wanted to play a facilitating role in the development of community allotment gardens for Sooke area residents and those who do not have suitable backyard gardens, or access to gardens, to grow food.

In the summer of 2009 the District asked Food CHI to develop the Sunriver Allotment garden, a 2.5 acres site, part of the old Phillips Farm. Phoebe Dunbar and Jessica Boquist led the development of this successful garden.

Sooke Food CHI has a licence to occupy this site, an agreement with the District of Sooke.

Starting in February 2009, with many citizens signed up for a plot, work began to install roadways, drainage ditches, paths, irrigation, deer fencing, gates, tool shed, a parking lot and eventually turn the sod under and till the field.





The community donated over \$50,000 in kind for services and materials to make the garden happen. By early May close to 65 plots had been assigned and summer gardens were planted. Food Chi offered a number of workshops to help new gardeners get going. During the summer, walk-abouts were led by experienced Sooke gardeners, mentoring, to teach the gardeners best practices.

Enough food was produced in our first year to feed many families, and throughout August to October supply surplus food to Sooke's agencies: Ayre Manor, Seniors Centre, Food Bank, Meals on Wheels, Crisis Centre and low income residents. This past summer close to 100 nettle plants from East Sooke were planted at Sunriver. We hope each year to add local food plants to our native garden. In the fullness of time this will include wild berries too.

With the addition of a large garden gazebo, 24' in diameter, designed and constructed by Sooke Marine Industries, the garden has played host to

numerous gatherings and events this summer and fall. These engaging events all involved food – growing, harvesting, sharing and eating.

By the end of 2010 a Sunriver Garden Council will be established to operate the gardens.

## SOOKE REGION FOOD CHI SOCIETY Notes to Financial Statements - Year Ended August 31, 2010

#### Note 1: Nature of Activities

Sooke Region Food CHI Society is a registered not-for-profit society consisting of a group of concerned individuals, producers and consumers from the Sooke District, Otter Point, East Sooke, Shirley and Port Renfrew. It is concerned about local food production and is developing a food strategy for the Sooke Region.

#### **Note 2: Significant Accounting Policies**

The restricted fund method of accounting for contributions, which includes government grants, is used. Results are reported in the general fund and special purpose funds.

#### **Fund Accounting**

Fund accounting procedures recognize external restrictions on the use of contributions by donors or granting agencies.

- The general fund reports assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses for general operations.
- Special purpose funds report assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses for:
  - Farm Mentorship Program
  - Sunriver Allotment Garden

#### **Capital Assets**

The following criteria apply:

- Capital assets acquired or constructed are recorded at cost. Donated capital assets are recorded at their fair market value on the date of donation.
- Amortization is recorded on a declining-balance basis using CRA asset classes.

#### **Revenue Recognition**

Unrestricted operating grants and donations, are recognized as revenue when received. Such grants, if contributed for a future period, are deferred and reported as deferred contributions until that future period. Externally restricted contributions, grants, and donations are reported as revenue depending on the nature of restrictions imposed on the use of the funds by the contributors.
